




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FROM THE EDITOR'S DESK

RADICAL GRATITUDE

Throughout my life I have been blessed with good health, and lots of energy. I have loved to fill my days with activity.

I have now reached a stage when my body is telling me to slow down. Two hip surgeries, and knee surgeries, took away pain, but also some of my ability to walk smoothly.

Nowadays I notice how high a step is. I see railings and banisters with gratitude. I am grateful for elevators, for benches in parks, and for washrooms on the main floor in a restaurant.

Most churches were originally built without any thought for the elderly or the handicapped. The average church had six to ten steps to the front door, washrooms in a basement down 18 – 20 steps. Even coffee hours and pot luck suppers took place in basement halls. Now churches are constructing ramps and elevators, even renovating worship spaces.

This past winter I had a serious fall. It was a rainy day in February, when water was turning into ice. I stepped out the door to go to the car. Two steps later my feet flew out from under me and I landed heavily on my left shoulder. Immediately I knew I was in trouble. I had broken the humerus bone in my left arm. Four months later my bone has still not healed, and I am awaiting surgery to fasten together two parts of my bone.

Through the past months, since February 17th, I have had to live with only one arm. With the help of my devoted husband, I have needed help to dress, to cut my food, and to get to all appointments. I have also seen this as a time to let go of some of my activities. This was probably one of the hardest changes. Would I ever again be able to help those around me? I have had to learn how to step away, and learn to accept help graciously. It has not been easy to give up being “in charge”.

But I thank God every day for the love and care I have received during the past four months. As I await surgery at the end of June, God is teaching me to age with radical gratitude.

THOSE LAZY, HAZY, CRAZY DAYS OF SUMMER....

An informal book review

As summer approached, I wanted to choose a book to read. I closed my eyes and put my hand along the bookcase of books I have bought because someone recommended them to me, but I hadn't yet read. I pulled out "As Kingfishers Catch Fire. A Conversation on the Ways of God Formed by the Words of God" by Eugene H. Peterson (WaterBrook Publications, 2017).

You may have heard the author's name before. Eugene H. Peterson is the person who put out The Message Bible which I sometimes enjoy, and I occasionally think is irreverent. But what it is not irrelevant, as what seems irreverent to me might just be the pathway some younger person may think makes the bible relevant to them. When I feel blocked in my reading of a certain text of scripture in the NRSV, The King James or the New Oxford I pull out The Message Bible. This has such a new take on it that it freshens God's message, helps me see the passage anew and allows for new insights.



Just this week I began to look at "As Kingfishers..." The book has seven parts to it, with seven different scriptures addressed in each section. It is a collection of sermons preached on these scriptures. Parts 1-4 are from the Old Testament, and the last three, the New Testament. That makes it a sermon-a-day 6 days a week for 49 days which is ideal for summer.

I have a confession to make. In two different periods of my faith journey I have had a problem with reading some of the Old Testament because, in places, it seems so violent and harsh. I began to even feel angry lately that we 'had to' read it in church thinking "Why would people want to hear about a God who judges and rains down punishment on people." So simplistic, I know. But I had to get around this stumbling block if I wanted to continue preaching. It was worrisome to say the least.

When asked to speak on retreats over the last several years on some aspect of the Christian life I always found I was asked to do a talk about some aspect of faith that challenged me; some part of my worship that needed strengthening. That is how I knew God was doing the asking. Each talk I have given has challenged me to work on some aspect of my walk. This did my spiritual journey a lot of good so, when I reached for a book this week and saw that many of the sermons were on the Old Testament I laughed and knew this was the book God wanted to challenge me with at this time.

In the introduction Peterson, a Presbyterian minister, tells the reader that the first five books of the bible are commonly known as The Books of Moses. They weren't written by Moses but many unnamed Hebrew prophetic minds who told and wrote what was gathered into those books. They are made up mostly of stories and signposts. The stories show us God working with and speaking to men and women in a rich variety of circumstances. God is presented to us not in ideas and arguments but in events and actions that involve us personally. Attending to the stories and signposts helps us find the way God wants us to live. And, most importantly, Peterson says that those five books are foundational for the subsequent sixty-one. I call that "a must read".

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THOSE LAZY, HAZY, CRAZY DAYS OF SUMMER....

Okay, Lord, you are on. When I began reading the first sermon on Genesis 1:1-2:4. I found it invigorating. By the time I read the second sermon on Genesis 12 and Moses' relationship with God I knew I was reading what the Lord wanted me to be reading, and, most importantly, I felt differently. The anger I had felt about the Old Testament was beginning to dissipate as I looked on it from Peterson's perspective. I can't wait till the next sermon. Help me grow, Lord.

So, I leave you with a question...what book, lecture, podcast series is the Lord challenging you to grow with this summer? Will it be "Kingfishers..." or.....?



Three questions to begin:

Have you done it?

If not; Are you doing it?

If not; Are you thinking about it?

All of these lead to the follow up questions:

If you have done it: What has it changed for you and your community?

If you are doing it: How is it changing you and your ministry?

If you are thinking about it: What is stopping you from taking the plunge?

I hope that as we move forward with the newsletters under our new editor (George) we will see an ongoing dialogue in this newsletter that will help us all to see what changes this programme has wrought, is causing and enabling.

I am in the middle of the programme. I have done 2 pandemic years on the Old and New Testaments. They have made me think each week about what I have read and how I should interpret what I read. They have made me think about how the words I read and read regularly from different parts of the Bible relate to today, and our lives in our Christian and world communities.

I also had to restrain my desire to discuss and debate. I had to open my ears and listen. I am still trying to listen and rearrange the fragments I hear into a new jigsaw puzzle for today.

Rob (Bob) McLachlan – BIOGRAPHY – “Candidate for LRA President” @ AGM 21 May 2022.

a) General: Rob was born and raised in a Montreal Anglican family. As a youth he attended Sunday school and was confirmed in St. Matthews Church (NDG), and later assisted in the teaching of some classes. He married in same Church, his High school sweetheart and partner for 50+ years, Louise Kudrewatych (Eastern Orthodox). They have 2 Adult sons, 2 granddaughters and 1 grandson. Rob is Bilingual, in his mid-70’s, very “young-at-heart”. He is a cancer Survivor, without needing now any prescription drugs. Enjoying an active outdoor life, he also works out several time a week, at his West-Island Gym.



- Since **2016**, Rob has been a **practicing Lay Reader**, and is a Parishioner, as well as Worship Committee Member at “All Saints by the Lake”, Dorval QC. Since **2020** he has been on the Lay Reader Association (**LRA**) **Executive group** as their **Secretary**. Now Rob is **spearheading the LRA Recruiting & Revitalization executive team, in devising more effective ways to increase Membership, within our Diocese.**

- **Professional Career: (40 years, full time)** - Formerly Rob was a **High-Tech Sales & Marketing Manager of IBM Canada** and initially retired after 25 years. Then afterwards became **Vice President for 2 different International Software Sales & Consulting firms**; later became a **National Hi-Tech Recruiting Director** for 2 different **Staffing firms**. Today Rob works part-time, as **Principal** of his own **Hi-Tech & Management Recruiting firm (ROTOMAC)**

- **Academically:** - Rob did **undergraduate studies** in Economics at **Concordia**, and later Accounting and Management at **McGill**. He is also a **graduate** of the **Canadian Army, Senior Officer Staff College** in Kingston and became a **Lieutenant-Colonel**, within the **Reserve Army** (Canadian Grenadier Guards).

In **2017** Rob was accepted into the post-graduate level (part-time) **Credit Study Programme at Montreal Diocesan Theological College**. Since then, over the years, he has taken 8 semesters of courses, related to “**Certificate in Theology**” Rob is now considering switching over in **2023** to their “**Licentiate in Theology**” programme

b) Church & Theology (part-time): In mid-1990’s to early 2000’s attended with wife, numerous **Eastern Orthodox Services**, in Montreal (& Rawdon), at both St. Peter & St. Paul’s and St. Nicholas. Established theological friendship with Father Irénée Rochon, who later became Bishop, and eventually the Orthodox Archbishop of Canada.

- In **2004-2008** attended and graduated from **Education for Ministry (EFM) Programme** (Church of Resurrection).

- In **2008**, had a “**Life-changing & Uplifting Spiritual Experience**”: With wife, did a **Pilgrimage** (with **Bishop Barry Clarke** and approx. 80 others) for a **12 day Tour of the Holy Land**. Visited many Biblical sites (NT & OT), and walked in the same areas where our Lord Jesus lived, preached, died and resurrected. Both **he and his wife** were “**revitalized with the Holy Spirit**”; along with embedded memories of the sights & sounds of Biblical times, which previously they had only read about.

- **2015 - 2018**, was a **Choir Member, Church of the Resurrection**, and later at **All Saints** (both in Dorval); plus **Synod Delegate** (1 as Substitute; 1 as Delegate), Rev Sophie Rolland, Church of the Resurrection.

- During **Summer 2016**, completed his **EFM “Mentor Certification”** at McGill/Dio. Also during **2016-2018**, was a **Volunteer & Lay Assistant at Veteran’s Hospital, Ste. Anne de Bellevue**, alongside **Rev. Stephen Petrie**.

- In **2017**, was accepted into post-graduate level (part-time) **Credit Study Programme at Montreal Diocesan Theological College**. As of **spring 2021**, his **8 course semesters taken included**: New Testament; Hebrew Bible; Christian Spirituality; Liturgy in the Church; Social Justice; Preaching & Teaching Paul; Anglican Theology & History and Christian Theology for a Global Church.

- Since **March 2019** until **now May 2022**, (i.e. **102+ Weeks**) have been one of a few **All Saints “Zoom Prayer Leaders”**, for the 6 days a week (45 minute) online “**Evening Prayer Services**”. In addition, was also (usually every 4-6 weeks) either the **Sunday Service Zoom Celebrant, or Preacher**. Plus, did same at certain “**in-person**” Church Zoom services, during spring/summer 2021. As a result, wrote **Lay Reader’s Newsletter Article** (from EP experiences) on: “**ZOOM” Experiences & Outcomes – Notes for Liturgical Zoomers!**

- In **March 2022** had published in the **Diocesan Newsletter** a LR “**Recruiting**” article entitled: “**Why might YOU want to consider the Ministry of a Diocesan Lay Reader?**”

- For **June 2022**, is publishing **2nd Newsletter LR “Recruiting”** article, entitled “**How you can REVIVE your spiritual journey with God, your minister and your parishioners - all online!**”
